Turning humanitarian principles into action



The **Sphere Handbook**, *The Humanitarian Charter and Minimum Standards in Humanitarian Response*, is the humanitarian community's flagship set of standards.

Founded on humanitarian principles, human rights, and evidence, Sphere standards enable professionals and volunteers to deliver quality assistance and protection to crisis-affected communities, upholding their fundamental right to life with dignity.

In April 2016, we asked people to tell us more about how they are using the Sphere Handbook. This is what we learned.

People using the Handbook in 149 countries shared their views...

We reach nearly **80,000 practitioners** around the world with tools, support, training and learning. Sphere **focal points** are working in **38 countries**.

...of whom **more than 40%** are working in countries with ongoing humanitarian crises or situations of concern;

Nine out of ten find the Sphere Handbook useful in their daily work.

2,800 users took the survey.

Six out of ten volunteered to contribute to the next Handbook revision.





- Most use it to guide assessment, design, delivery and evaluation.
- Capacity-building and training run a close second.
- Other uses are policy development, negotiations, advocacy, and research.

- The Handbook is currently available in 28 languages.
- Nearly a third of the responses are from humanitarians with less than five years of experience
- More than half have worked in the sector for less than 10 years
- This suggests that the Handbook is a key tool for new practitioners as they enter the sector
